
INTRODUCTION

RETROSPECTIVE: MARLON RIGGS

Out on Screen honours the life and work of award winning video/filmmaker Marlon Riggs who died of AIDS-related illness on April 5, 1994. Riggs' groundbreaking work articulates the politics of silence and exclusion, while celebrating a rich culture and the joys of liberation. The films included in the retrospective speak with voices suffused with the rage, sorrow, humour, poetry and music of a community recognizing a shared history of racism and homophobia, while affirming the diversity of its members.



USA, 1991, video, 9 min.

A revolutionary call for a new vision of America to include and celibrate African American and gay voices. The video features poetry, rap, African chant, dance and a hip hop soundtrack.

TONGUES UNTIED

USA, 1989, 16mm/video, 55 min.

Perhaps Riggs' best known work, it seeks to shatter the silence surrounding homosexuality in the black community and confronts the invisibility of black men in the gay community that is only broken by stereotypical images. The film weaves an autobiographical document of Riggs' search to come to terms with and eventually accept stigmatized identities with an initiation in black, gay culture.

There will be a short intermission following Tongues Untied.

1990, USA, 16mm/video, 10 min.


A young man's joyous recount of his first sexual experience is intercut with GMAD's (Gay Men of African Descent) reception of anger and heckling as they march in a black pride parade. The piece concludes with a demand for the integration of gay experience into the larger black community.

1992, USA, 16mm/video, 38 min.

Five HIV positive men describe their reactions to learning their sero-status, experiences coming out to their families and communities, and reflect on issues of identity and their own mortality.



Juliet Bashore, 1991, UK, video, 45 min.



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P R O F I L E: PRATIBHA PARMAR

Wednesday, July 20, 9 pm

Curated by the Programming Committee
ASL Interpretors will be present this evening.

Film and video maker Pratibha Parmar comes out of the British "Black Arts" movement, which has been instrumental in the last twenty years in creating a new and articulate reality for marginalized communities at the same time as fighting the vicious racism, sexism and homophobia of the Thatcher government which was in power when Parmar started working. A colleague of cultural studies theorist Stuart Hall, she is also part of a community of academics which sees engaging oneself with popular culture as a necessary part of theorizing about it. She is co-editor of two books, Lesbians Talk (Safer Sex) (Scarlett Press, 1992) and Queer Looks (Routledge, 1993). Her film and video work has questioned conventions around documentary at the same time as working subjectively within it. Her works are often about individuals and the political contexts in which they work. As much as posible she works and frames her work from the point of view of the identities she perceives herself as occupying: South Asian, lesbian, feminist. Works other than those shown tonight include Flesh and Paper (about writer Suniti Namjoshi), Memory Pictures (about photographer Sunil Gupta), Reframing AIDS (which challenges dominant representations of the AIDS crisis), A Place of Rage (about Angela Davis, June Jordan and Alice Walker), and most recently Warrior Marks, with Alice Walker (a film about female genital mutilation.)

SARI RED

UK, 1988, video, 12 min.

A moving visual poem in memory of Kalbinder Kaur Hayre who was killed in a racist attack. The tape speaks of the ever-present threat of violence upon the lives of South Asian women in both private and public spheres.

EMERGENCE

UK, 1986, video, 18 min.

A poignant examination of the search for identity and meaning, which presents the culture of diaspora in all its complexity through the lives and works of four women artists and poets of colour. Confronted by racism and exclusion, these women undergo a painful yet liberating process in trying to define themselves in relation to their own cultures and a wider society.

DOUBLE THE TROUBLE, TWICE THE FUN

UK, 1992, video, 25 min.

A rare and lively examination of lesbians and gay men living with a wide range of disabilities. "Some of us are shy of mirrors, some of us have never had them," explains writer Firdaus Kangra, who sets out to find a mirror image and gain access to himself. In this tape made for Channel Four, Parmar has crafted a mirror which remains far too unusual in lesbian and gay cultural work.

KHUSH

UK, 1991, 16mm on video, 24 min.


"Khush" means ecstatic pleasure in Urdu. For South Asian lesbians and gay men the term captures the blissful intricacies of being queer and of colour. This lyrical documentary uses inspiring testimonies to bridge geographical differences between Britain, North America and India and to locate shared experiences of isolation and exoticization, as well as the unremitting joys and solidarity of being khush.





Transsexuals, transgenderites and women who pass as men speak from a place of dignity and strength in a collection of videos that explodes and dismantles the gender tyranny of our society. Disturbing, provocative and fun, this programme asks difficult questions about the nature of lesbian, qay and bisexual communities and identities.

MAD ABOUT THE BOY

Alix Umen, USA, 1994, video, 7 min. An endearing look at the ins and outs of the lesbian boy. A humourous exploration of the perils and pitfalls of passing.

IN LOVING MEMORY

Leone Knight, Australia, 1993, film on video, 15 min. Female-to-male transsexuality and female fetishism are explored in an entrancing performance.

GENDER TROUBLEMAKERS

Jeanne B. and Xanthra Phillipa, Canada, 1993, video, 25 min. "We are two gender queens, gender outlaws, trans-dykes, gender troublemakers" so begins this intimate portrait of the video makers, two kick-ass radical transgender activists living in Toronto. Jeanne and Xanthra publich *Gendertrash*, a transgender zine, and give the dish on gay male misogyny and all of its complex articulations in contemporary gay culture.

P(L)AIN TRUTH

Ilppo Pohjola, Finland, 1993, 35mm on video, 15 min. A "symbolic documentary" charting the transformation of Rudi from a biological woman to a biological man. This visually stunning portrait of a female-to-male transsexual reveals a transformation that is both painful and cathartic.

OUTLAW

Alisa Lebow, USA, 1994, video, 26 min. Leslie Feinberg, author of *Stone Butch Blues*, is featured in this documentary on transgendered identity and the gender community. Feinberg discusses her experiences as a transgendered individual with pride and courage, from the pre-Stonewall era to the present.

ARE BODIES OUR SELVES?

These tapes allow the "silent" body to speak. In sickness and in health, bodies are remembered, commemorated, ritualized and celebrated. The subjects under scrutiny insist on thoughtful and visceral consideration of how our perceived bodies inform the psyches, identities and sexualities of ourselves and others.

SEIZE IN LOVE

Estate of Art McP, Canada, 1991, video, 13 min.

A meditation on the death of a male body, calling into question language, memory and theoretical texts. Ultimately the physical is discursive.

BLACK BODY

Thomas Allen Harris, USA, 1992, video, 5 min.

This short challenges the dominant cultural gaze on the black male body.

DISAPPEARING ACT

Gideon Ferebee, USA, 1990, video, 8 min.

A monologue which posits being black and HIV positive as making one doubly invisible, and loosing weight as a prelude to disappearing.

FAT CHANCE

Anne Golden, Canada, 1994, video, 10 min.

This lesbian loves her voluptuous self: food, sex and sizeism.

SAINT MULEKICKER

Simeon Hunter, USA, 1992, 16mm on video, 6 min.

Tattoed, pierced and HIV positve, Ron Athey is a performance artist who manipulates his body with controlled precision and erotic playfulness.

MY BODY IS A METAPHOR

Stasie Friedrich, Canada, 1991, video, 7 min.

With its images of body decoration practices, this tape is a response to the inability to feel, touch and express in a culture that enforces social regulation of the body.

CHASING THE MOON

Dawn Suggs, USA, 1991, video, 3 min.

Dreamlike - this soundless narrative is the meditation of a Black lesbian grappling with the memory of an attack that makes her wary of being on the street.

WATER INTO FIRE

Zachary Longboy, Canada, 1994, video, 10 min.

This gay First Nations artist offers a poetic and honest response to the question "How has his HIV positive status affected him and his community."


THE BODY BEAUTIFUL


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CENSORSHIP: CHOUT HOUT HUBBLE

Within lesbian and gay communities, anti-censorhsip is typically understood in terms of the 'free' production of explicit depictions of our sexual practices. To broaden the anti-censorship debate, this programme examines anti-censorship not just in terms of freedom of expression, but in terms of voice. What are the ways in which our various communities have been silenced? What are some of the issues about which we silence ourselves?

And how are we talking back?

INTRO TO CULTURAL SKIT-ZO-FRENIA

Jamika Ajalon, USA, 1993, video, 10 min.

An experimental tape capturing the anger of Black lesbians and gays over the rise of homophobia in Black communities, which juxtaposes that homophobia with the sexism and colourism originating in the history of slavery in the US.

IS IT SAFE TO COME OUT YET?

Neesha Dosanjh, Canada, 1994, video, 21 min.

A documentary-style tape which examines gender roles and sexuality within Sikh communities. Placing homoeroticism within the Sikh religion, the tape looks at the ways that homoeroticism has been obscured.

TWO-SPIRIT PEOPLE

Lori Levy & Michael Beauchemin, USA, 1991, video, 20 min. Interviews with Two-Spirit indigenous people explore the "Berdache" tradition of many indigenous cultures. The tape examines the role played by colonial writings about indigenous peoples in obscuring and distorting this tradition, and touches on the work of Two-Spirit peoples to reclaim traditional gender and sexuality roles.


NIGHT VISIONS



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

Structured around the "Wayang Kulit" Malaysian shadow puppet theatre's characteristic interplay of dark and light, this Fisher Price PXL video draws together verbal and visual references to both the artist's Islamic culture and her exploration of s/m sexuality.

TRUST YOU

Katherine Setzer, 1991, Canada, video, 1:40 min. A bold portrait of an emotional ponderance about sex, trust and power. The wet details of the bathtub bring forward remembrances of encounters revealing the struggle to love in face of vulnerability and passion.

EXCESS IS WHAT I CAME FOR

Paula Gignac & Kathleen Pirrie Adams, 1994, Canada, video, 5 min.

A beat-driven, flesh-filled document of the nocturnal paradise that was "Dyke Night" at the Boom Boom Room in Toronto.

Susan Muska, 1992, USA, video, 3 min. A tale of a sex encounter: slick with a twist. Erotic or disturbing, Stafford's story provocatively explores elements of dyke sexuality.


SHE DON'T FADE

Cheryl Dunye, 1991, USA, video, 23 min. This work examines the sexuality of Shae Clark, a Black lesbian played by Dunye herself, who tells of a "new approach to women" and embarks on a journey to find the woman of her dreams. Dunye's mix of humour and storytelling gives the video an upbeat flavour that will leave you wanting more.

NO REWIND

Paula Mozen, USA, 1992, video, 23 min.

A blend of storytelling, humourous role playing and condom how-tos which challenges the viewer to break through the denial myth of "it couldn't happen to me" and encourages disussion about sex and relevant social issues. Including the stories of HIV positive youth and peer educators, the tape focuses on education and communication as central to making the changes necessary to prevent the spread of HIV.

HOMOTEENS

Joan Jubela, USA, 1993, video, 56 min.

Videomaker Joan Jubela lets five queer teens produce their own autobiographical segments, giving them space to narrate their own stories in their own distinctive voices: Monique talks about being a Latina dyke in New York City; Peter's segment is about his longdistance relationship with his closeted boyfriend; an anonymous youth talks about the racism and homophobia he experiences in school; 17 year old community organizer Henry Diaz gives us a look into the organization which helped him come out; and Nicky speaks about her experiences as an Afro-Caribbean-American lesbian, growing up as a Jehovah's Witness and being institutionalized for being a lesbian. This is a warm and insightful look from an inclusive group of homoteens. Best Video at the 1993 San Fransisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival.

Youth has never been a quiet place, nor a place without knowledge. It is a place of possibility where people are not entrenched in the rigid social categories that define adulthood - affected but not yet swallowed up by the imperative to define one's self. One might say that the young people who move through these works have the makings of queerness, but I would prefer to say that they just are as they are, living their lives in the wholeness of youth, fighting the fragmentation of the self into various parts. Works in *Innocent Wisdoms* begin from a place of experience and move outwards.

INTREPIDISSIMA

Marta Belletbò-Coll, Spain, 1992, 35 mm on video, 7 min. A young "intrepidissima" schemes to make sure her mother can never take her out shopping for dresses again. She would much rather hang out in her room fantasizing about being an orchestra conductor.

SISTERS IN THE LIFE: FIRST LOVE

Yvonne Welbon, USA, 1993, video, 35 min.

Donna knows that she loves her best friend Karen more than any boys at school. Aware that their feelings might be frowned upon by others, the two young women are still able to come to a place of understanding with one another.

MONIQUE

Yvonne Welbon, USA, 1990, 16mm, 3 min.

There is a kind of intimacy between the only two black girls at a school. Their fascination with one another is never articulated in words, but shows itself in the regularity of their fights everyday after class.

LEFTOVERS

Janine Fung, Canada, 1994, 16 mm, 8 min.

There is an argument among family members that at a verbal level is about the daughter's lesbian friend. The daughter reads it as her family's inability to accept her, the daughter, for what she is at levels far more complex and difficult to articulate than merely sexuality.

BOY CRAZY


Laura Cowell, Canada, 1994, video, 2 min. A charming and mischeivous confession about stepping out into the straight world.

KISSES ON A TRAIN


Dinaz Stafford, USA, 1993, video, 30 min.

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

Ray and Tyrone are raising Ray's nephew Eric, whose mother recently died of AIDS-related illness. When Eric contracts pneumonia they discover that he is HIV positive. A poignant story of living with AIDS and family love.

Cheryl Dunye, USA, 1992, video, 22 min.




Marla Leech, Dan Veltri and Remco Kobus, USA, 1992, video, 16 min.










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BEYOND LOSS: TWO VOICES

Sunday, July 24, I pm Video In, 1965 Main Street Curated by Maureen Bradley

Two videos unveiling the complex and touching bond between two different relationships grappling with and moving beyond loss. These two videos focus on relationships rather than issues amidst the difficulty of living with breast cancer and AIDS. The two voices that come together in each video reveal a transformative relationship that transcends loss.

LE RECIT D'A (THE TALE OF A.)

Esther Valiquette, Quebec, 1991, video, 20 min.

A poetic expression of friendship and struggle in the age of AIDS between the videomaker, Esther Valiquette, and her friend Andrew, both of whom are HIV postive. "Several tales evolve within the same video: parallel universes... that echo each other without ever crossing over. The tale of Andrew, the diary of a voyage and the thoughts of Edmond Jabe are all elements in the free play of composition. The video also speaks of a change in consciousness, of the opening up of an apparently dead end and fatal issue." (Esther Valiquette)

CANCER IN TWO VOICES

Lucy Massie Phenix, USA, 1993, video, 43 min.

"I am the first among our friends to have cancer. There will be others, as the statistics show," wrote Barbara Rosenblum after having been diagnosed with breast cancer in 1985. Rosenblaum and her partner, author Sandra Butler, co-wrote the book Cancer in Two Voices - exploring how the love between these two women transcended the pain of breast cancer. Both speak candidly in this intimate video about who they are - Jewish, lesbians, friends and lovers - and honestly about their feelings of guilt and anger. This video expresses warmth, intimacy and loss like "an emotional twister that lifts you up."

JOURNEYS

Not all the journeys artists take fit neatly into a curatorial vision - even a collective vision - but not all stories can wait for the proverbial "next year". Love, race and history are central to these tapes, yet each artist experiences and responds to these in very different ways. What draws them together is the poetry and urgency in their voices.

THE LIVING TREE

Zachary Longboy, Canada, 1993, video, 30 sec. You, Me and HIV.

TO RIDE A COW

Quentin Lee & Deeya Loram, USA, 1992, video, 24 min.

A seriously playful narrative that explores a queer menage-a-trois between a gay Chinese boy, a bisexual half-white-half-asian boy and a straight Korean girl. "Ride a Cow to find a horse" is the pseudo-proverb that describes the bisexual's politics, opening up questions of solidarity (between feminism and queerness), and power (who's the bottom boy?) in the background of race and sexuality.

GHOST BODY

Chris Cultrone, USA, 1992, video, 20 min. A passionate and poetic reverie on the quandry of interracial gay male desire and sexuality. Reminiscences of a history of intimacy marked by overdetermined racial discourses paly across the body of the white subject, as voices struggle to speak of the contradictory and fragmented internal experience of racial identities in intimate relationships.


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

DARK SUN: BRIGHT SHADE

A collection of queer shorts which give voice to emerging Canadian filmmakers, highlighted by Kwoi's compelling and visually striking Dark Sun: Bright Shade - the love story of an exiled T'ien An Men Square student dissident and a young Chinese-Canadian artist. Together the voices in these films challenge an essential construction or understanding of what it is to be gay, and acknowledge the ways our experiences and personal histories are both constraints and viewpoints on loving men.

SOUL NEPTUNE

Ken Sherman, Canada, 1994, 16mm, 5 min. A lyrical study of movement and light reflecting on Western man's struggles with his need for freedom and self-expression.

BETWEEN YOU AND ME

Ken Anderlini, Canada, 1994, 16mm, 10 min.

Multiple takes on the AIDS pandemic, moving from grief to anger with complacency and media homophobia, lead to questions about the differences between safe sex slogans and safer sex as an ethic.

FRANK'S COCK

Mike Hoolboom, Canada, 1993, 16mm, 7 min. A lover recounts his relationship with and love for Frank (in particular his cock) as microbiology and porn enframe his story. A humourous and honest fiction.

DARK SUN: BRIGHT SHADE

Kwoi, Canada, 1993, 16mm, 54 min.

An exiled T'ien An Men Square student dissident is haunted by memories which strain his relationship with his Chinese-Canadian lover. This is a poetic exploration of cultural differences between two Asian men, acknowledging that being "gay" is often bounded by one's own cultural background. Confucian ethics and Western complacency come under scrutiny as sexuality, politics and desire collide.

REEL DYKES

Beyond their focus and content, each of these films is marked by its lush, sensuous visuals. From relationships to fantasy, to exile and abandonment, these works ask us to experience these stories on many levels, always drawing our attention to the pleasure of the sensual.

CRUEL

Desi del Valle, 1993, USA, 16 mm, 20 min. Del Valle's first film poingantly portrays the angst of breakup complicated by feelings of betrayal as a Latina woman leaves her lover from the same cultural background, for a white lesbian. This dramatic, stark black and white film intertwines parallel narratives; loss is complicated by the political reality of desire for the "other".

JUMPING THE GUN

Jackie Farkas, Australia 1992, 16mm, 11 min The very tall Amelia Rose (whose initials spell ART) passes through a surreal landscape of personal identity to face off against an adversary (whose initials spell MAN). A quirky fairy tale about a very tall girl who wishes she were small.

PEACH

Christine Parker, New Zealand, 35mm, 16 min. "Taste it while it is ripe, or let it rot." Fruit becomes a metaphor for sex as a young Maori woman is seduced (and abandoned) by her white-trash boyfriend's new co-worker - a truck driving, swaggering, blond butch. This lush filmic short drama playfully explores the tensions of fleeting desire.


COCONUT, CANE AND CUTLASS

"To dare to be all that you are is almost taboo." This poetic and informative work delves into questions of identity and exile, outlining the difficulty experienced in both Canada and Guyana by Indo-Carribean women who identify as feminists and lesbians. Music by Lee Pui Ming.

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
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
