### Festival Passes

The Festival Pass gives you flexibility, front-of-line privileges and full access to all Festival screenings with the exception of the Gala films, select parties and events. Passholders must arrive at least 30 minutes in advance of each screening. Passes are non-transferable and you may be required to show photo ID. All Festival Passes purchased online will be mailed

Please note: Passholders must pick up screening slips for the films they wish to see that evening at the Passholder Table. Only screening slips for films at that theatre are available. The Passholder Table is open 45 minutes before the first screening of the day.

Please note: a generous allotment of seating is reserved for Passholders at every screening; however, seating cannot be guaranteed. Seats are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

### Memberships \$4

The Vancouver Queer Film Festival presents films and videos that may not have been classified by the BC Film Classification Office. Under BC law, any person wishing to see these unclassified films must belong to the Vancouver Out On Screen Film and Video Society. Annual membership is open to anyone 18 years or older and must be purchased at the Membership Table prior to your first screening or online at:

Remember: you must show your membership card at every screening! If you have forgotten your membership card, you must purchase another in order to be allowed into the theatre.

45% of Out On Screen's budget currently relies on government funding. Revenue generated by memberships doesn't just go to the Queer Film Festival - funds are allocated across the Festival, Out in Schools and the Oueer History Project. By purchasing a membership, you're making an investment in Out On Screen, and in our community.

Will Call opens 30 minutes prior to the first screening of the day. Tickets available at Will Call are for same day screenings only. Please arrive at least 30 minutes in advance of the screening to collect your tickets. Only the person who purchased the tickets will be permitted to pick up the order. You must present valid photo ID and your credit card.

### Refunds, Exchanges & Schedule Changes

The Vancouver Queer Film Festival does not offer refunds or exchanges on tickets under any circumstances. The exception: occasionally, due to circumstances beyond our control, screenings must be changed, rescheduled or cancelled. We offer refunds only if a screening is cancelled.



#### **Accessible Washrooms**

We aim to use venues with washrooms that are physically accessible as well as accessible to individuals of all genders. We will place gender-destabilizing signs on washroom doors at all of our Festival venues. Pick the shortest line!

ASL interpretation will be available at a select number of screenings as indicated on the schedule (p. 1). Subtitled films are noted in the film pages.

### **Community Tickets**

A limited number of complimentary tickets are available through local community groups for those individuals who face financial obstacles. The program is generously supported by CCEC Credit Union.

### **Companion Seating**

Complimentary seating is available for companions and caretakers of people with disabilities. Make sure to pick up a ticket at the Theatre Box Office of the screening you plan to attend.

### **Childcare Subsidies**

Upon request at the Theatre Box Office childcare subsidies are available for all screenings. Parents or guardians will be given a maximum of \$10 per screening to assist with childcare costs. The subsidies are generously supported by barbara findlay, QC.

Designated chairs are available for people with special needs while waiting in line for entrance into the theatre. Please look for our Accessibility Volunteer.

**Undertow**'s breathtaking Peruvian seaside setting will effortlessly captivate you. It will just as easily sweep you away with the story of Miguel and Santiago—a pair of passionate and handsome men having an affair. But this debut feature by director Javier Fuentes-León delves far deeper than forbidden love on moonlit beaches.

**Undertow** is a film about the delicate process of making peace between seemingly unreconcilable extremes. Fisherman and father-to-be Miguel walks a fine line. His steadfast commitments to his Catholic faith, local village traditions and machismo culture are at odds with his unshakable feelings for his artsy, free-spirited gay lover. When Santiago dies in a boating accident, it looks as though Miguel's inner conflict may be over. Instead, the return of Santiago's ghost forces Miguel's two worlds more closely—and uncomfortably—together. Bravely, yet haphazardly, he scrambles to appease the external expectations of family and village life and also honour his own inner truths. In this film of keen juxtapositions, losses are authentically grieved and triumphs are quietly celebrated, all before the riveting and bittersweet final scene.

# SEA PURPLE (Viola Di Mare)

Being born female earns Angela very little favour in her 19<sup>th</sup> century Sicilian mining village. Her father is bitterly open about his disappointment that his only child is a girl. Her withdrawn mother and aunt leave an absence of matriarchal role models in Angela's life. In spite of her family's indifference towards her, Angela spends her girlhood freely running along the rocky seashore, smoking tobacco with the boys and falling headlong in love with her best friend Sara. When she grows up and announces her wish to marry Sara, Angela is suddenly in a troubled spotlight as her family and neighbours reel at the news. After every attempt to overturn the relationship, from beatings to arranged marriages, the community finally accepts their young love on one condition—that Angela becomes Angelo and lives the rest of her life as a man. Both triumph and tribulation follow as Angela's transition reshapes the entire village.

**Sea Purple**'s plot is professedly based on real events that took place on an island near Sicily, events that were handed down by word of mouth over generations until they became something of an Italian queer legend. Director Donatella Maiorca named the film **Sea Purple** after a Mediterranean saltwater fish that is born female but can change into a male during the course of its life.



**Strella** has all the makings of a post-modern Greek tragedy, with just as many twists of strange fate as Sophocles' *Oedipus Rex*. Suspense, romance, birth and death are all rendered with incredible gusto. But rather than leaving its players maimed or exiled, like the plays of ancient Greece, **Strella** reveals a provocative, vital humanity through its one-of-a-kind characters.

Yiorgos is released from prison after fourteen years of incarceration for a murder he committed in his small Greek village. Calling all kings and king lovers (and we're especially calling those who don't quite know what a drag king is). And the Rest Is Drag is a contemplative, campy and frequently cocky drag documentary directed by Melisa Brittain and Danielle Peers (G.I.M.P Bootcamp) and awardwinning author Shani Mootoo. "Kinging" is explored through a mix of performance footage and interviews with members of the Alberta Beef Drag King Troupe, spoken word artist TL Cowan, gender theorist Judith "Jack" Halberstam and many others. Gender nonconformity and the experiences of race, class, size and ability inform the diverse drag personalities portrayed. And naturally, humour, flirtation and raunchy fun play a large role, too.

## Diagnosing Difference

How does it feel to have your gender identity included in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM)? Historically, doctors and psychiatrists have positioned themselves as the "experts" on transgender experiences, creating diagnoses that inform legal policies, health care and even everyday social aspects of life. Diagnosing Difference features interviews with diverse scholars, activists and artists who identify on the trans spectrum (transgender, transsexual, genderqueer and gender variant) about the impact of Gender Identity Disorder on their lives and communities.

Susan Stryker, Dean Spade, Ryka Aoki, Shawna Virago and nine others offer their personal voices to the debate around the diagnosis. This documentary is groundbreaking and incredibly timely, as the 5<sup>th</sup> edition of the DSM is scheduled for publication by the American Psychiatric Association in 2013. Whether this revision will include Gender Identity Disorder as a diagnosis currently remains a dilemma both among health care professionals and trans communities.

There are blockbuster science fiction films, films that feature Robert Downey Jr blowing up entire city blocks in his super suit, for example. Then there's psychological classics, such as the *Dr Who* series or *The Fly*, which employ alternative realities to probe age-old existential questions of identity and human experience. **Earthling**—with its puzzling plot—can be placed in the latter camp.

Judith, the protagonist, is a high-school teacher in crisis. She can't get pregnant, a strange rash is growing on her forehead and she is plagued by reoccurring dreams of an astronaut and unidentified life forms. Moreover, she's inexplicably drawn to a female student and the two begin an affair only to realize that they are actually members of a stranded alien race living on Earth. As in all worthwhile sci-fi, the question "What does it mean to be human?" is asked, as well as "Why do we love who we love?" Earthling offers no solid answers; the film's strength is in the beautiful cinematography, solid acting and the unique questions it raises.

But **Far Out** has plenty to distinguish it as a stand-alone series. The actresses don't have LA Diet bodies, for starters, nor do they appear to have spent hours on hair and makeup. "I wanted to show what life for gay women is really like," director Faye Hughes said. "That we have real and valid relationships, that we can be butch dykes or girly girls or anything in between, that we have kids, responsible jobs, families, ambitions and aspirations. This isn't a group of men sitting in a boardroom making a series for money." The first few webisodes aired as Britain's first online lesbian TV series; **Far Out** will be coming to OUTtv in the fall. Check out this sneak peek.

Mr Right features a cast of the "usual suspects" seen in gay romantic films: the perfect boyfriend, the artsy queen, the hunky and arrogant slut, etc. Similarly, the central plotline is familiar: boy meets boy, boy loses boy, boy wins boy back. While this classic rom com is easy to sit back and enjoy, there are also many things that set it apart. The actors are an attractive bunch (with adorable Brit accents to boot), however, Mr Right does not rely on glistening abs and bubble butts to win over audiences.

Instead, the brother/sister filmmaking team—Jacqueline and David Morris—have made a refreshingly authentic script and a cast of talented actors the film's strengths.

The quintessential question "Is Mr Right really out there?" is explored in depth without sugar-coating or cheesy happy endings. Set in London's gay SoHo neighbourhood, Mr Right is a real slice of gay life.

Natalie might consider herself just another Jewish, lesbian, aspiring filmmaker, dominatrix living in Manhattan's lower eastside. Her risqué career and queer lifestyle are perfectly normal to her. On the other hand, her girlfriend Jasmine's discomfort with her job reaches almost comical proportions and threatens their new relationship. More troubles turn up when an egotistical film director that Natalie interns for hits on her. Natalie handles the situation with sexy, domineering style, but there are unexpected consequences to being a young assertive woman in the male-driven film industry. Shaken, Natalie turns to the comfort and everyday wisdom of her matriarchal Jewish family and finds confidence in herself again. But will self-confidence and sex appeal be enough for her to make the right connections in the film business? Determined to make her first movie, Natalie devises a dicey, yet devilishly clever plan.

Winner of the Best Canadian Feature Film at the 2010 ReelWorld International Film Festival **Off World** is an ethereal and eye-opening portrait of one of the Philippines' most notorious slums.

Lucky, a Filipino adoptee, makes the emotionally laden journey from his home in Toronto to the Philippines to discover his birthplace: Smokey Mountain. Once known as the Kingdom of Tondo, Smokey Mountain is now a vast urban slum surrounding a mountain of garbage, named for the methane gases that visibly leak from refuse accumulated over the course of more than half a century. Guided by Julia, a worker at a local NGO, Lucky discovers he has a gay, genderqueer brother and grapples not only with the glaring poverty, but with the ramifications of queer life in the Phillippines. In order to define himself and connect with his roots, Lucky immerses himself in the culture of Smokey Mountain and his brother's life, uncovering still more tangible links to his past.

Nepal—historically a deeply conservative country—currently has the most progressive policies on homosexuality in Asia. Between 2007 and 2008, Nepal's Supreme Court struck down laws discriminating against homosexuals, approved same-sex marriages and directed the government to provide full equality rights. Further to this, the Supreme Court made a ruling that acknowledges third gender identity for trans and queer peoples, and recognition of a third gender on government-issued documents. Despite these recent legal changes, the government has been slow to put many of these rights into action.

Nani Walker's **Other Nature** documents a changing Nepal through the eyes of Nepali queer people. Walker—a Napalese-American herself—spent several months in Kathmandu and trekking the Mustang region in order to best connect with her documentary characters. The result is a truly diverse range of candid voices, including an outspoken trans sex worker, Nepal's first openly gay politician, a pair of teenage lesbian runaways and a Buddhist nun.

Looking for a tear-jerker and feel-good film rolled into one? This documentary reveals the tender heart and soul of Italy—a stronghold of Catholicism and conventionality. While neighbouring countries such as Spain and Belgium recognize marriage equality and celebrate Pride, Italy has made little movement in the advancement of queer rights. What remains even more constant than homophobia is the critical role of family life. Blood runs thick in Italy. Large, closely-knit families are revered; parents are staunchly devoted to their children. Parents Reborn follows several families as they adjust to the news that their sons or daughters are homosexual.

Director Claudio Cipelletti's camera doesn't shy away from raw emotions as parents cope with their crushed expectations and begin to accept their children for who they are. In turn, these parents experience their own transformation—or rebirth—as they forge renewed family bonds and approach traditional Italian life in progressive new ways.


This film can boast being a truly experimental, collaboratively created thriller, murder mystery, dyke drama. Sound alluring, yet hard to picture? Imagine *Mulholland Drive* meets *I Know What You Did Last Summer* meets a lesbian feminist collective meeting, all set in the stark California deserts outside of Beverly Hills. Made by The Parliament Film Collective, co-founded by Dunye to help queer filmmakers produce exciting and original work, **The Owls** employs a hybrid of drama and auto-documentary filmmaking. The action hones in on four older dykes (Older Wiser Lesbians = Owls), who seem to have learned very little about healthy relationships and living dramafree. They are barely keeping it together while hiding a dark secret.




A quintessential queer Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> movie, this mind-bending nightmarish thriller flick centres on the mysterious disappearance of fictional gay porn star Mark Anton at the height of his career in 1995. Rumours of murder and blackmail cloud the incident, until present-day writer Michael Castigan unwittingly moves into Mark's old apartment and his investigation of the events surrounding the mystery begin to stir up the same malevolent energy that destroyed Mark. As Michael digs deeper and seemingly comes closer to the truth, his own world unravels into an eerie, surrealistic waking dream.

Film critics have compared director David Kittredge to David Lynch and David Cronenberg. The San Francisco Examiner called Pornography: A Thriller "this millennium's answer to Twin Peaks." Disturbing and creepy with plenty of genuine chills and simulated sex, Pornography: A Thriller has kept audiences at the edge of their seats at more than twenty queer film festivals and counting.

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
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**Queer Prom**



#### The Taqwacores

In 2003, M Knight wrote his first novel with the vehement desire to portray himself: an observant Muslim and a transgressive American youth. *The Taqwacores* is about a fictitious Islamic punk scene; the music and people were all completely made up. Originally circulated as a free zine, the novel was unexpectedly popular, especially with young Muslim Americans. So popular that some readers were inspired to form their own bands and forge their own manifestos—and a true taqwacores scene was founded. While the book was praised, it also received heated criticism that the women and queer characters had only token voices.

Recaptured by director Eyad Zahra, **The Taqwacores** was voted one of the top ten films at Sundance 2010. The film centres on a communal house where the roommates clash, yet bond on being punk and Muslim while living in a country that's hostile to them in many ways. Learning from Knight's oversights, Zahra offers more screen time to discussions of feminism and queer identity than in the original book. While there is only one out character representing Muslim queercore amongst his heteronormative peers, the themes of building a community that pushes back against oppression, bridges roots with radical desires and struggles to come together, should speak to queers, nonconformists and visionaries alike.

Picture a summer road trip: France's autoroute unfolding before Two Spirits is a beautifully diplomatic documentary that tells the loss of one mother's son—a son who might have unearthed some answers to our past of what it means to be Two Spirit. Fred Martinez was nádleehí, a male-bodied person with a feminine nature, a special gift according to his ancient Navajo culture. He was one of the youngest hate crime victims in Euro sex-radicals Wendy Delorme, Judy Minx, Ena Metzgerei and Mad modern history when he was brutally murdered at sixteen by a young man who bragged to friends that he had "bug-smashed a fag."

> This film tangles our society's current comprehension of what it means to be Two Spirit as a position of individual experiences in relation to its traumatic history and current understandings of the Two Spirit sect within our extended communities. Two Spirits explores the life and death of a boy who was also a girl and the essentially spiritual nature of gender and sexuality. The film makes the case that in the twenty-first century we need to return to traditional values.

**Watercolours** opens with a poignant line from a Pablo Neruda poem: "Love is so short and forgetting is so long."

On the opening night of his first New York art exhibit, Danny reflects on the inspiration of his paintings. Memories of his first love, Carter, are triggered and through a series of flashbacks a bumpy coming-ofage story is told. Danny's mother takes in Carter, a high school athlete with golden-boy looks and a troubled home life. Danny—a nerdy type—helps Carter with his homework and before long these tutorials turn into mutual attraction. Their blossoming relationship brings Danny out of his shell, awakening both his sexuality and creativity. But it is heartache that drives Danny to paint as he discovers the hard way that only art can turn pain into beauty. Fifteen years later, Danny is faced with the reality that he has never truly moved on and let go.

Often hailed as acclaimed Hong Kong director Stanley Kwan's "coming out" film, Yang ± Yin: Gender in Chinese Cinema takes an intimate look at homoerotic undercurrents and cross-gender expressions in a century of Chinese cinema. Rare archival footage of Chinese-language films from the 1930s-1990s is interwoven with Kwan's reflections on his gay sexuality, feminine sensibility and relation to his parents. The director conducts candid and highly personal interviews with his famous colleagues, which include directors John Woo, Chen Kaige, Ang Lee, Tsui Hark, Tsai Ming-liang and actor Leslie Cheung. A treat for film buffs, and an eye-opener for anyone who thinks queer cinema began in the West.

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
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
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#### My Hand is a Red Brick: Marrying Story to Image

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
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
