Little Sister's vs. Big Brother

Thursday August 8 / 7:00 pm / Capitol 6 / Opening Gala

Jump feet first into the Canadian politics of free expression with the much heralded documentary, **Little Sister's vs. Big Brother**. In the face of bigotry, bombings, and repeated seizures of books by Canada Customs, it's a tale of trial and triumph for Vancouver's Little Sister's Book & Art Emporium. Store owners, Jim Deva and Bruce Smyth, along with their committed staff, take the battle for our right to read all the way to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Through Artfin Weissman's camera, we meet Little Sister's manager, Janine Fife, and book specialist Mark Wardrop. We watch them as, with the support of the Vancouver queer community, fellow bookstores, and advocates of free speech, they wage the most important battle in Canadian legal history against Canada Customs and state censorship.

The film features a stellar cast of writers and activists, including Pierre Bellem, Jane Rule, Sarah Schulman and Pat Caine. They speak out passionately on the issues of censorship, pornography, SM and the banning of queer words and images. We also hear from Little Sister's lawyer Joe Arns, who took the case to the Supreme Court, and John Dorn of the B.C. Civil Liberties Association who advocates for the freedom of expression of all Canadians.

Since 1994 Weissman has been there at the key moments, capturing the dramatic moments, court decisions, the shock of violence inflicted on the gay community, moments of personal courage and the resonance of government censorship in the new era of increased official control of information and state security paranoia.

With clips from Air Force, Front Page Challenge and Better Than Chocolate, we see how Canada Customs' censorship has been satisfied and framed by other media. Featuring archival footage going back to 1903 when the bookstore opened, and interviews with the heroes at the center of this David and Goliath story, **Little Sister's vs. Big Brother** provides an astonishing, intimate and provocative look at the world of independent bookstores, the cultural impact of the internet and the power of free expression in a democracy.

It's fitting that Weissman's film should be the August 8 Opening Gala event in Vancouver where owners and patrons of Little Sister's had to risk bombings and bigamy to preserve their Chapter rights.

Notorious C.H.O.

Saturday August 17 / 7:00 pm / Van East Cinema



Filmed at Seattle's Paramount Theatre, **Notorious C.H.O.** captures the irreverent actress' recent 37th birthday, ending with a career triumph at Carnegie Hall.

A reserved post-9/11 opening monologue dedicated to rescue workers off Ground Zero sets off a typically irreverent direction, setting the tone for a torrent of fresh material. Margaret Cho reveals the quest for her G-spot (not found in an eye-popping visit to a straight S&M club), guff on how the world would be different if men had periods ("Every bachelor apartment would look like a murder scene"), and perhaps a little more than we need to know about her visit to a Los Angeles cosmetic injection clinic.


Men gay and straight alike are skewered as Cho regales us with stories about her best friends from her high school days in San Francisco, Alan and Jeremy, two teenage drag queens who taught her how to be fabulous, funny and fierce. ("Cruising Drag Queen, Heaven Fagget," she calls them).

Cho summons up that fierceness for her closing monologue, which turns serious to confront the trauma of growing up with an eating disorder in a society where thinness is synonymous with beauty and self-worth. Skinny super models need not apply in Cho's world where beauty comes packaged as John Goodman look-alike hill clowns.


An interview with both her mother and father, shot when Cho brought the tour to a sold-out audience at Davies Hall in San Francisco, provides further insight into the enduring performance art of one of America's funniest and most intelligent comic talents. The follow-up to the box office record-breaking *I'm the One That I Want*, **Notorious C.H.O.** avows the content of such comedic stalwarts as Eddie Murphy and Richard Pryor. A big, giant champion of racial, sexual, and gender equality, this is Cho at her unfurled, uncentered, and unspeakable best.

Ke Kulanu He Mahu: Remembering A Sense Of Place

What was intended as a documentary containing Hawaiian drag culture with that of the U.S. mainland has become a poignant look at the largely undocumented world of the Muu.

Broadly described as gay or transgender people, the Muu were revered and honoured as healers and esteemed members of traditional Hawaiian society. With the suppression and homophobia of Western colonization, they became increasingly marginalized.

This moving documentary ascetics the connections between the muu and broader Hawaiian culture, portraying the importance of both land and identity to indigenous Hawaiians. The island's multi-faceted indigenous gay and transgender community is explored through interviews with the community's most visible supporters, activists, families, oral traditionists and Pacific historians. Big production numbers, photos and lithographs are interspersed with interviews of individuals like Hra Wong, a cross-dressing instructor of the Hawaiian language. Meet the Taipalatis, a tight-knit Israeli family of Argentinian descent, and their daughter Marin, who has just come out to them as a lesbian. This documentary has taken honors awards from the Toronto Lesbian and Gay Film Festival, The Montreal Jewish Film Festival and the New York Gay and Lesbian Film Festival. Director Gonen Glaser captures Marin's siblings and parents expressing their individual points of view which range from disappointment to strained attempts at acceptance.

While her oldest brother is firm in his disapproval, Marin's parents are far more conflicted, moving from initial condemnation to re-evaluation. Providing a snapshot of queer life in Israel today, *It Will End Up In Tears* examines the complexities of modern life, maturity and family in a divided Israel.

Yellow Peppers an Israeli documentary about two young Jewish lesbians who fall in love, smoke many cigarettes and decide to open a soup restaurant together.

Two events collide in the Eternal City. As Catholics converge for the most important Church pilgrimage in modern times in Rome, thousands of gays and lesbians from around the planet gather for the first international Gay Pride Celebration.

Joe Belbas (director of *George, News & Me!*) crafts a compelling portrait of the clash and contentious. The Vatican opposes the Pride March as an insult to Catholics. Parade organizers say the marchers will be "an army of peace." A Catholic activist calls the event "an act of war against the Catholic Church," a fact he claims is proven by the march's support from "radical" politicians, Masons and Jews — "always united ... against the Catholic civilization." No wonder the church's allies in opening the march are right-wing and neo-fascist parties. Organizers finally get permission from the waffling city officials to proceed with fresh rally just three days before it is set to begin. Ultimately, the march becomes a defining moment, not just for the Italian gay pride movement but for hundreds of thousands of proud queers from around the world.

As Quebecois director Denis Légeros steps up to the plate with his slickest outing to date, we are introduced to the eponymous Danny, an adolescent youth in search of nothing short of acceptance and love.

Danny is the confused child of a gay father incapable of showing his feelings and a merciful fashion diva who died of an overdose when Danny was a young kid. We find Danny, played by newcomer Théophile Pujin, in a quest for identity in a world where looks and performance — even sexual — are one's most valued attitudes. It's a world where one must succeed at all costs, regardless of who gets crushed along the way. He finds his way from his dreams by becoming a model for others that to its extreme by becoming a go-go boy. He finds true love he is looking for on the set of a porno shoot with Karine, a photographer who's as voyeuristic as Danny is archetypal. It's at the bottom of this slippery slope of sexuality that Danny finds the resolution he always wanted.



Not knowing what their reaction will be, and afraid of the discolour he is sure they will feel, Ricky turns to his friends for support. Until his family come down, he hangs out at his friend Mark's. The two boys start to enjoy being together—much to the chagrin of Mark's girlfriend. This powerful documentary takes us through the extraordinary life of Harry Hay, labour organizer and Marxist teacher. Winner of the Golden Gate Award at the 2002 San Francisco International Film Festival, **Hope Along the Wind** chronicles a crucial piece of the gay rights movement.

Hay joined the Communist Party in the early 1930s and participated in the San Francisco general strike of 1934. In the Fifties, he was called before the House Un-American Activities Committee after which he founded the Mattachine Society, one of the first U.S. gay rights organizations. This moving film features poignant interviews with Hay and other surviving members of this brave group of gay men. In the last 40 years, Hay immersed himself in the counterculture & youth movement, the Riotous Fifties and Native American culture. As we discover the stories of others like Harry Hay, we can open ourselves to greater possibilities when our diverse struggles for liberation.

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

Kali soon discovers her performance artist and completely self-absorbed girlfriend, Crystal, has been cheating on her. Kali kicks the girl out, but finds the singles game isn't any better. She gets a hidden turn at sex-machine bunnies and smoke in her face from a cook-chop-eating homogirl (Kali is a vegetarian). To Kali's surprise, she starts to develop feelings for her bitch-hater co-worker Reese, just as Kali starts to feel a fruster who herself, now ex-girlfriend Crystal shows up again, devastating her love. Confused and conflicted, Kali turns to her Tanz-anthropes lesbian godmothers and receives some remarkably enlightened advice about the fluidity of desire. Watching the truly radiant Lucy Davis as Kali move from Crystal to Reese and back again, it's almost easy to accept director Carpenter's message of love being bigger than the narrow identities we inhabit.

This clever and sensual romantic comedy, with its palette of rich Caribbean colors and a vibrant soundtrack by superstar singer Michael Masego, gently challenges us to follow our hearts, wherever they may take us.

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


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

Naomi is failing in the porn industry. Her housemates are art-house porn while her friends are commercial. She's a mother to her older sisters. As Naomi inches closer to the end of her tether, she finds solace in the virtual arms of an online girl known simply as 'Sugar'. With porn on head for the moment, Naomi begins work on a reality-based television show starring her best friend, Asics, and Miki, a businesswoman with a penchant for stripping off as soon as the sun goes down. With 'Sugar' starting up in her nation, Miki is breaking hearts on camera, and leaves on the verge of relationship meltdown. Naomi's life gets even more complicated.

Simon & I recounts the lives of two giants in the South African gay and lesbian liberation movement, the filmmaker herself, Bey Tlisse, and Simon Nauli. Outside places together the story of her personal and political journey from her days as a lonely and isolated South African to her present occupation as an activist, filmmaker and musician. At 17, she met Nauli when she attended the first meeting of the Gay and Lesbian Organization of the Athlete's Council (G.L.O.C.). She remembers how impressed she was by his leadership qualities and political clout.

The film illustrates their political success in lobbying for the inclusion of sexual orientation in the South African Bill of Rights and Nelson Mandela's new constitution. With Nauli's HIV-positive status and illnesses, the increasing emphasis on AIDS-related issues results in a loss of momentum within the liberation movement. *Simon & I* records how she felt marginalized from the organization, both as a woman and as a black person. Reconciled shortly before Nauli's death in 1998, these remarkable characters bear witness to the enormous sacrifices required of human rights activists. This searing testament shows us two powerful personalities, united in one struggle.

This feature film directed by Native American writer Sherman Alexie (Smokin' Sprawl), stars Evan Adams (Smoke Sprawl) as Seymour Pudak, a successful Native American poet. When a late-night phone call summons him back to the reserve for a funeral, Seymour must face his ghosts, stardom and the question: "To reflect a tragic culture must you stay and live a tragic life?" Seymour sets off on a spiritual and emotional journey to find the answer.

Seymour is reuniting with his childhood friend, Aristotle (Gene Tapia). The young man graduated and headed off to university where Seymour flourished and Aristotle quickly floundered. Finally heading back to the reserve and the safety and warmth of his expectations. In college, Seymour takes up with a Jewish Indian named Agnes (Michelle St. John) who supports him until he discovers that he's gay. From this point, Seymour's life expands until he is one of the most respected poets in the country, dining with the president, honoured by all and even finding his white life partner.

Alexie has created a deep and evocative work that gives voice to the diversity of Native experiences in America.

At the time, the filmmaker was a 22-year-old student at the University of Toronto and is said to have "profoundly" influenced classmate, David Cronenberg.

A wonderfully subtle film, **Winter Kept Us Warm** tells the story of the unlikely friendship that develops between two very different students, Doug (John Labey), an economics major, is a well-liked senior with an equally popular girlfriend. When he meets Peter (Harry Hayvenet), a shy freshman new to the big city, he immediately takes the young man under his wing. The two become fast friends and are soon going to caravans, driving and playing in the snow together. Just when you think you've got things figured out though, the story takes a surprising turn and ends on an unexpected note.

Throw in a groovy soundtrack and some rare glimpses of 1960's Toronto and you end up with a definite must-see film!


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
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
