


Don't miss your flight around the world to visit queens in Jamaica, Mexico, India and more in the **Passport Series**.

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

Gerry Brunet Memorial Award

For Best Short Film or Video created after 2002 by a British Columbian director.

Established in 1997, this juried award is in recognition of Gerry Brunet, a committed and lifelong contributor to arts organizations and an early board member of Out On Screen. 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

Click your heels together and transport yourself to the Opening Gala presentation of **The Wizard of Oz** – this time as a Sing-A-Long! The Judy Garland classic comes to life in its queerest technicolor yet, and for the first time in Vancouver. AIDS+ Brilliance is sure to come courtesy of audience members whose participation is, simply, part of the show.

Based on L. Frank Baum's book series, **The Wizard of Oz** has become one of the most celebrated musicals of all time. For queer audiences the symbolism is a delight – a land of escape where dreams come true, rainbow, the Emerald City and, well, Judy Garland.

The story is a hopeful one. A journey of seemingly mismatched archetypal characters in search of a Wizard to grant them a heart, a home, a brain and some courage. Through cooperation and acceptance of one another, they triumph over adversity, and make it to the land of Oz. Only once they meet the Wizard do they realize that they don't need his help after all. Judy Garland – who was presented with a special Academy Award for outstanding work by a juvenile performer for her role as Dorothy – is recognized as one of queer culture's most beloved icons. Many have noted that her funeral on June 17, 1969 preceded the revolutionary Stonewall riots, which have since inspired queers all over the world to unite in the fight for equality.

So dust off your ruby slippers and dress as your favorite character. We're off to sing the Wizard! This evening will be packed with fabulous live entertainment, prizes and goodies.

Little Darlings

This hugely popular coming of age film from 1980 is a playful romp through the pains of adolescence and the joys of friendship as seen through the eyes of two teenage girls who meet at summer camp. Angel Bright (Kristy McNichol, best known for her role as turnkey Bloody Lawrence in the 1970's TV series *Fame*) is the girl from the wrong side of the tracks, while Faris Whitney (Tatum O'Neal) is well-educated, well-travelled and well-mingled.

Angel immediately notices codin as Whitney, dressed in a bikini. Jagger (white trouser staff) is forced to share a cabin with Angel, dressed in a tight 70's t-shirt and jeans. Pitted against one another, a wager is set by the camp on who will lose her virginity first.

Camp counselor and all-around macho-man Armand Lassante plays the object of Whitney's affection, Angel, on the other hand, has different hopes that take form in a boy from the next camp named Randy (a very young Matt Dillon).

They each set traps to catch their prey – Whitney entices the camp counselor to give her swimming lessons while Angel plies Randy with beer, but neither is successful in their initial attempts. In between schemes the girls, including the earthy country Sunshine Walker (played by Sox and the City's Cynthia Nixon), fill their summer days in all manner of tomfoolery; food fights, pyramids, and spying on skinny dipping boys.

By the end of the summer both girls are transformed forever having learned much about themselves, their sexuality and the power of female friendship. A delight in 1980 for audiences with a queer gaze, **Little Darlings** takes us back to the heady days of summer camp and the familiar taste of unrequited desire.

Homo/barephobes, attitudes towards race, age, health, lack of money, all of these issues complicate accessing media training and facilities for queer emerging artists. Out On Screen, in partnership with Video in Studios, created the Queer Video Production Scholarship in an attempt to remedy these barriers. The program provides an inclusive atmosphere, industry-standard equipment and editing facilities, and the mentorship of established video artists to six scholarship participants.



This program is in memory of local trans activist and filmmaker Cheshire WGS Burnham. Dedicated activists like her have paved the way towards greater freedom for youth and adults alike to live out gender variant identities, and from an earlier age than most of us once dared to imagine.

Learn about love and acceptance in **No Doubts Questions** as three perspectives and anticipate young sisters adjust to little Bill becoming Aunt Barbara. Based on fiction, **The Boy I Decided to be Nina** is set in hyper-realistic documentary form and shows Guido's sincere determination to live life as the girl everyone knows her to be. **As Long as They are Happy** looks at Nina's relationship with his parents and their religious community after he comes out as FTM during his late teens. A call from the past in **Thinking of You** inspires some joy and a compromise.

Young. Queer. Canadian. This documentary offers an intimate introduction to the lives of Adam, Richard and Adina, three teenagers journeying through the Triangle Program in Toronto. Their stories are as unique as their alternate secondary school program itself – one set up by the Toronto District School Board as a haven for queer youth, and the only school of its kind in Canada.

Adina questions her religion and spirituality while attending the Triangle program, noting the irony that her school is located in the basement of a church. Adam has finally escaped the homophobia of his former school and finds security here, only to be released again into the outside world. And Richard questions the value of the curriculum, drops out of school and moves out of his homophobic mother's house to be with his first love.

Class Queers provides a contemporary view of the teenage struggle towards positive self-identity and relationships. Their struggles win them the right to take whenever they want to protest and to wear either parent's formal wear.

According to local Mexican legend, the patron saint Vincent Ferrer was sent by the Lord to drop a 'mafia' (homosexual) in each town throughout Central America. When a charming 25-year-old widow named Mrs. Miyashita Ferrier accidentally split most of the mafias in Juchitan - and created a queer paradise.

In a land known for its machismo and deeply ingrained gender roles, Juchitan is home to the Zapotec Indians whose community has generally welcomed and nurtured the mutants. Patricia Henriquez's film explores the lives of many of the town's queers, from butchers and peasants to drag queens and hijadores. Juchitan is unique in its vibrant display of gender and sexual fluidity. Homomorphy is rare, queer sexualities are honored, and femininity especially is cherished. One gay teacher even argues with his fellow residents that men who haven't slept with their man sex aren't real men.

This lively community also takes pride in cramming as many queer parties into a year as possible. The film follows the preparations of one of Juchitan's larger events, which is hosted annually by the town's gay basketball team. Whether it's in their family life, work, or celebration, the residents of Juchitan offer a vivid and thoughtful portrait of diversity, acceptance and queer integration.

Who says that sex stops after retirement? Although the women of **Lily Festival** – ages 60 to 91 – have long outlived their husbands, they would certainly beg to differ. When a charming 75-year-old widow named Mrs. Miyashita Ferrier accidentally split most of the mafias in Japan. This is no Hollywood love story. Based on an instant-warming novel and directed by a veteran of over 300 jaku-geki (soft-core porn films), **Lily Festival** is as sexually subversive as it is sweetly erotic.

Centring around the characters Mrs. Miyashita, whose close relationship with a Miami neighbour was cut short by the woman's sudden death, **Lily Festival** explores the effects that the presence of honey-pingued Mr. Miyashita has on Mrs. Miyashita and the other women in the building. His flirtation with the widows brings out a unique boldness in each woman. Rather than falling into the misogynist trap of destroying each other for Mr. Miyashita's lucrative attentions, the widows of **Lily Festival** undertake real social advancements, flying in the face of social mores that insist older women must be submissive and sexual. Where we might expect to see a circle biting - Mrs. Miyashita and Mr. Miyashita falling in love – **Lily Festival** shows the freedom that sexual fluidity can offer us at any age.

Mocking the Pinoy Queervolution

Predominantly a loose worldwide Christian nation and haven of political turmoil, the Philippines has an interesting historical background, carrying a colorful yet tumultuous difficult evolution of the Pinoy (street slang for Filipino) queer. This program starts with **Church Dogg**, an daring examination of women's faith and its symbiotic use of dogs as playful deceivers. **Mene** is one woman's courageous fight of an oppressive culture. The experimental **Box** explores educational conditions in the country while it subtly speaks of stereotyping people. We then discover that individuality finds wider spaces in the split-screen short **Frontiers**. Two documentaries follow as **Margin** seeks acceptance for young gay men in the corners of a hypocritical society while **Whomman** reveals third world perspectives in a lesbian's outlook on life. The voyeuristic **Peep** ends the show as a curious copy with majestic discontinuities in life.

In this sense, **Songs of Freedom** breaks new ground as the first documentary about gay life in Jamaica, reflecting the universal quest for human dignity in the face of oppression.

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



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**Brother Outsider:
The Life of Bayard Rustin**

If you have never heard of Bayard Rustin, you're not alone. Since his greatest work as a civil rights movement organizer was done mostly behind the scenes, his contributions have largely been reduced to footnotes. This compelling new film by two award-winning filmmakers chronicles Rustin's complex life story - a tale of race, homophobia and struggle.

Early in 1968, Bayard Rustin travelled from New York to Montgomery, Alabama to assist with the boycott of the city's segregated bus system. Upon arriving, he discovered guns inside Martin Luther King Jr.'s house and armed guards posted outside King's doors. Rustin persuaded boycott leaders to adopt complete non-violence, teaching King about Mahatma Gandhi's vision and strategy of civil disobedience. Rustin helped to mold the younger King into an international symbol of peace and nonviolence, and organized the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Yet Rustin was silenced, threatened, beaten, arrested, imprisoned and fired from important leadership positions - sometimes because of his uncompromising political beliefs, but often because he was a gay man in a fiercely homophobic era.

Brother Outsider: The Life Of Bayard Rustin continues rare archival footage with provocative interviews to illustrate the life and work of a forgotten prophet of social change.

Sassy, stunning and technically ground-breaking, **A.K.A.** traces a young man's rise of passage in a world where privilege, power and love are at for sale. A.K.A. is packed with potent dramatic thrust, presenting its story in a triptych, flitting the screen with three simultaneous, side-by-side images offering three perspectives on every scene. This disorienting technique grants the film emotional power, deftly seeking out subtle details that punctuate a hand-headed look at human ruthlessness and vulnerability.

Reflection

The Growth of Queer Cinema

Back in 1988, I was a member of the first Board of Directors that founded Out On Screen. We had come together to organize a film component of the 1990 Gay Games Cultural Festival, and our initial aim was to just get through the Games. Little did we know that an annual Festival had been born which would become a vital cultural event for Vancouver's queer community for the next 15 years.

Since then, the film and video presented has been enthralling, compelling and most importantly, queer. Board members have come and gone but the audiences always remained faithful.

In 15 years the festival has witnessed an explosion of growth in queer cinema. Initially, it was a challenge to find feature-length dramatic as well as short film. This clearly contrasts with the reality in 2003, as Festival programmers choose from a wealth of dramatic and documentary features, as well as many polished & nicely produced shorts. At London's Lesbian & Gay Film Festival, which I attended in April, over 60 features and 100 shorts were presented to packed audiences.

In the early days of the Vancouver festival, programming themes often centred around the painful act of coming out, coping in a homophbic world and surviving in the thuggering world of AIDS. These themes definitely remain a part of today's queer cinema, though many other issues affecting our community have come into play: queer parenting, gay-bashing, same sex marriage, queer history, the jurney of sexual orientation, transgender and transsexual concerns, living successfully with HIV and the challenges of queer youth are all being represented in the queer catalog. Our visibility is everywhere except possibly mainstream Hollywood which still often tends to see us as neutered clowns or tragic sexual predators.

Queer cinema has matured over the last 15 years. Award winning gay filmmakers like Canada's John Cameron Mitchell and Tod Haynes (*Far From Heaven*) often saw their early shorts programmed in queer festivals such as Out On Screen's. Today their feature films, with queer content, play in suburban cineplexes. In the early 1990s, film critics began talking about the new wave of queer cinema. Ten years later, we're no longer so new, but thankfully we're still very queer. With queer film festivals in practically every corner of the world, preserving the best of queer cinema every year, the future is bright. I anticipate the Vancouver Queer Film & Video Festival will continue to stamp its unique imprint on film for years to come. Thank you Out On Screen and a very happy 15th birthday.

After a series of strange coincidences, In-woo begins to hear for his own sanity and his students, coworkers and wife are starting to wonder as well. When Hyun-bin finally confronts his teacher and demands to know what is going on, things really begin to tip over — only to fall back together again — in this tragic love story that is reminiscent of the films *An Affair To Remember* and *Romantic To A Kiss*. 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

The Varieties of Religious Experience is a forgotten classic look at an after-life's last-line tracing to the time of Ave Maria. Local director Michael New introduces us to Steven who is out to convert atheist quakers at the Pride march but is quickly faced with his own preconceptions of homelessness. In **Act of Faith**, two Muslim men speak of their struggle with Islam, a religion to which they remained faithful even as it rejected them. **Everything Must Come to Light** depicts South African women who left their husbands to become traditional healers (Sangomas) and to "take wives" as advised by their ancestors. The Sangomas hold an hermaphrodite position in their community using herbs and animal sacrifice to ward off evil spirits. On her deathbed, painter and author Marilyn Sanderson frequently speaks in **Lives of Marilyn Sanderson**. The award winning short film, **The Confession**, is a loving testament to faith and forgiveness.

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





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


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Rise Above: The Tribe 8 Documentary
