Out On Screen is responsible for operating in compliance with the Motion Picture Act and Consumer Protection BC. Our mandate is the encouragement and appreciation of motion pictures as a medium of art, information or education.

Some of our in-person film screenings may not have been rated by Consumer Protection BC. To attend an unrated film, you must be a member of the Society and be at least 18 years of age. Membership is by annual subscription. Members have access to all films with a valid ticket and can vote at our Annual General Meeting.

Mack Paul (xwməθkwəýəm) developed the Coast Salish Two Spirit symbol as a visual representation of Coast Salish Two Spirit unity, dignity and respect.

The design was created using traditional Coast Salish art style and shapes, and emulates the rainbow Pride symbol already used by our LGBTQ+ friends and allies.

This symbol was offered to all our relative Coast Salish Nations to use for their own programming, out of love and in honour of all our Two Spirit and Indigenous LGBTQ+ community members and relations.

Red represents Fire

Orange represents Vision or Visibility for Two Spirit People

Yellow is the Sun

Green shows the Land, where our Identity comes from

Blue represents Water

Purple depicts the məθkwəý plant (which grows on the land where Mack is from), but it also represents the Ecosystem in our different Coast Salish territories

The rainbow design is cradled in Coast Salish cloud formations.

The Squamish People have lived in the Vancouver area for many generations stretching back to the ice age and before. Our language, culture, and society were birthed from these lands by passing knowledge and history from one generation to another. Today, we are organized into the Squamish Nation – an amalgamation of several different Squamish People who share common ancestry and language.

On behalf of our people, the Squamish Nation welcomes you to the shared territory of the Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh peoples, where Vancouver now exists. We join our LGBTQAI2S+ community and family to celebrate our love for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions. This month and every month, we stand together with the millions of people who work to make this world a safer and more dignified place for all LGBTQAI2S+ people.

The Vancouver Queer Film Festival is a vibrant space for queer arts, culture, and community. It showcases dynamic and thought-provoking films from British Columbian filmmakers and other Canadian and international directors and storytellers. We thank the Vancouver Queer Film Festival for the work they do for our city.

"Oh my god, you're gorgeous. Who the hell are you?!"

The opening lines of *The Empress of Vancouver* are directed at a drag queen clad in a faux fur coat with towering blonde hair, pencilsharp eyebrows, and dark lipstick. She returns the compliment with a gracious "thank you" and turns to the camera. This is Oliv Howe, performer, artist, icon, and the 10th Empress of the Vancouver Dogwood Monarchist Society.

When she was crowned in 1981, Oliv's punk rock energy, gender-fucking performances and DIY glam aesthetic spoke to a political and artistic shift in Vancouver's drag community. Oliv represented the weirdos and freaks, the trans kings and queens and gender queers

This intimate documentary follows Sherenté Harris, a Two Spirit teenager as s/he comes of age. Sherenté is a member of the Narragansett tribe, one of the nations first impacted by contact with invading Europeans. This film was a four-year collaboration between director Stéphanie Lamorré, Sherenté, and their family. It is a story of colonial resistance, Two Spirit leadership, and the power of young people.

One of Sherenté's many passions is dancing. They grew up performing at powwows. But when Sherenté steps forward in full regalia as a Fancy Shawl dancer, s/he faces the colonial violence of the gender binary. Despite there being no formal rule to prohibit Two Spirit people from performing in a category different from their assigned gender, many of the judges hold Eurocentric beliefs about gender and sex. Sherenté's firm sense of self and the support of their family, elders, and fellow dancers creates a strong foundation to overcome these challenges.

"As an Indigenous, Two Spirit youth, the most controversial act I ever committed was being myself," says Sherenté. And like so many Indigenous youth around the world, Sherenté's act of being themselves creates space for their people, and for all of us, to be more truthful and courageous.





BLACK AS U R is a powerful glimpse into the complexity and beauty of being Black and gueer in the Black Lives Matter era. At the height of the pandemic, Black communities and allies took to the streets to demand an end to state-sanctioned violence against Black and Brown bodies. Days after the murder of George Floyd, a young trans woman, Iyanna Dior was brutally attacked in St. Paul, Minnesota. Filmmaker Micheal Rice explores the deadly impact of misogynoir and transphobia, shadowing the growing number of deaths of Black trans women and its implications in a system that persists injustice and violence against Black women. **BLACK AS U R** illuminates the role of gueer people in both historical and modern Black liberation movements, and the histories of homophobia within Black communities.



In 2016, Orlando's Pulse nightclub was the site of a horrific hate crime that left the queer community in Florida devastated. This documentary tells the story of one of the survivors: Jeannette Feliciano, a queer single mother and competitive body builder whose journey towards healing creates a path forward for others.

This film is a very realistic portrait of survival. For Jeannette—for all of us—life keeps coming relentlessly and trauma multiplies, barely leaving space to process from one incident to the next. But the hope this film provides is in seeing Jeannette find a way to empower herself in the face of challenges she has no direct control over. She runs a boot camp for Pulse survivors and queer community, helping others exorcise trauma from their bodies, building strength, stamina, confidence, and connection. Jeannette's care and attention to her body, her family, and her community grounds her in her own agency in a way that is truly inspiring.

Like many of us, Alex Liu came of age with a decidedly incomplete sex education. Christian moralism and patriarchal heteronormative values have laid the foundation for abstinence-only based sexual health education to proliferate throughout North American schools, encouraging a culture of silence and shame. After years of repression, Alex makes it his mission as an adult and a health reporter to seek out the sex ed he wished he'd received as a young person.

This cheeky documentary is full of fun and double entendres but is also a wealth of knowledge about sexual health and sexuality. From neuroscience labs to church pews, the film features provocative conversations with psychologists, sex researchers, educators, and spiritual leaders.

Alex is an earnest and endearing narrator, whose openness and vulnerability in the face of awkward questions and uncomfortable realizations creates opportunities for the audience to examine our own preconceived notions about sex.





Young and ready to take on her new life, Raphi dreams of falling in love and starting a traditional family. After moving from France to Barcelona and being diagnosed with gender dysphoria, Raphi attempts to maintain relationships with others in an anxiety-inducing process. The narrative follows Raphi's journey to self-define and self-love as a trans woman on the dating scene. In search of love and connection, she learns to trust herself and her newfound identity. This film is a thought-provoking and intimate look at self discovery and acceptance.

Nikki and Elise have known and loved each other since they were teens being raised in a strict Christian, conservative environment. After getting married, they decide to adopt a child, Sansa. Parenting roles and responsibilities allow Nikki to finally come out as trans; "I was trying so hard to be a dad, and I was miserable," she tells us. We follow Nikki and Elise as they explore and expand their gender roles beyond the family structures they grew up in.

There are many road bumps in the lives of this sweet and optimistic family. Nikki's transition is a direct challenge to the values of their families of origin, Elise fills the role of primary financial caregiver, and Sansa battles a leukemia diagnosis. Director Jena Burchick lovingly and collaboratively facilitates conversations about gender, parenting, work/ life balance, and navigating the healthcare and education systems. *Mom and M* is a tender and touching portrait of queer family, and is sure to warm your heart.

A extraordinarily original, wildly queer vision of cross-dimensional Burundian lovers seeking to overthrow their oppressors via the intersection of community and technology. Carrying a bold revolutionary spirit, **Neptune Frost** is a vivid waking dream, an anti-capitalist romance, an algorithmic musical, and a call to action.

Neptune, an intersex hacker, and Matalusa, an escaped miner, seek liberation from the systems that have turned their communities into a commodity for tech companies. 



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
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
